

Pastor's Corner

What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

John 1:3b-5

The events of Christmas seem far removed, and we may think God does not act as powerfully as he did in the days of Herod, and that God came among us and then left.

The Father sent the Son as a light in the darkness, St. John says, and that light *shines* – present tense – in the darkness. Jesus not only shines in darkness, but *exposes* the darkness. In the inhospitality of the citizens of Bethlehem to the pregnant Mary and her husband, in the slaughter of the innocents, and especially in the cross, we see how a dark world responds to light.

But that response was not universal. Some believed. Some became disciples, and through the gift of faith experienced the transforming power of grace. They received new life — His life — and they became light in the darkness, too. And suffered much the same fate as their Lord and Master and God.

We should expect the encounter with Jesus to be *convicting*. The light exposes our darkness and we see how we have become slaves to sin, how we have hurt others, how desperate our condition is. Often I am convicted by the faith and goodness I find in the lay faithful and in my Dominican brothers. The temptation is always to act like many Pharisees and scribes did when they met Jesus: to somehow detract, to find some flaw (real or imagined) that distracts me from my need to be healed and converted.

We needed a Savior, and we still need Him. Thanks be to God, Jesus is still God-With-Us: in the sacraments, in the scriptures, in His Body, the Church. He still invites us to choose to follow Him, to be forgiven, healed and to receive the gift of *new* life. We do not have to remain as we are. We can become children of God. That gift can be opened any day of the year. Even today.



Why Christmas is December 25th

The near universal celebration of Christmas on December 25 dates to the early fourth century. It is commonly said that this date was chosen to counter the birthday of the pagan "Invincible Sun" on that date. That explanation is not convincing. Saint Hippolytus of Rome's Commentary on Daniel 4:23 (dated A.D. 203), gives December 25 as Christ's birth date. Since celebration of the Invincible Sun's birth was not instituted at Rome until the reign of Emperor Aurelian (A.D. 270-275), the earlier existence of the Christian date makes a borrowing from pagan practice unlikely.

So why would Christians have picked December 25? Luke's Gospel tells us that the births of Jesus and John the Baptist were separated by six months, and that John the Baptist was conceived after his father Zacharias saw a vision in the Temple and was struck dumb. The popular stories of the "Infancy Gospel of James" (early 100s) also say that Zacharias was a high priest (which he was not), implying that his vision happened on the Jewish Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). That feast comes mostly in late September and probably did so in the second century too.

Ancient Christians could then have calculated nine months to the birthday of John the Baptist (late June) and then six months more to the birthday of Jesus (late December). Since the ancients believed June 24 was the longest day of the year and December 25 the shortest, settling on those as the exact dates would have been natural. Saint Bede (700s) wrote that John the Baptist preached that he had to decrease and Christ had to increase, and that is exactly what the daylight does, beginning on their respective birthdays.

La Directiva



Hoy celebramos el nacimiento de Jesús, comenzando con la Misa de Gallo. A esta Misa se le añade la tradición popular que ha comenzado en el hogar con pesebres, comidas y regalos. Se nos haría difícil imaginar terminar el año sin la Navidad. Pero el calendario cristiano sólo la ha festejado algunos 1800 años. Los primeros cristianos únicamente celebraban la Pascua de Resurrección, siguiendo lo que todos los evangelios nos relatan de los eventos de la Pasión, Muerte y Resurrección de Jesús. Sólo Mateo y Lucas mencionan su nacimiento.

Alrededor del año 200 d.C., los cristianos egipcios empezaron a conmemorar el nacimiento de Jesús el 20 de marzo que era el noveno mes de su calendario. Con el tiempo, la idea de festejar el nacimiento del Mesías se extendió a otras comunidades cristianas, pero con diversas fechas como el 19 de abril, el 6 de enero, el 28 de marzo y otras. Fue hasta el siglo cuarto que se fijó la fecha para el 25 de diciembre, gracias a Juan Crisóstomo y al Papa Julio I. Otras fuentes señalan que en el año 366 los cristianos comenzaron a celebrar el nacimiento de Cristo, sol de justicia, precisamente el 25 de diciembre.

En realidad no sabemos cuándo nació Jesús, pero sí sabemos que hay que celebrar el hecho que Dios se hizo uno de nosotros.
