

#### Pastor's Corner

This weekend we are celebrating the Solemnity of St. Dominic, our patron. We transferred his feast from August 8 to this date, so we can celebrate together as a parish. I would like to take a moment to let you see into our life. We are not diocesan priests who wear white. We have a common life together. Each day we meet to talk about our day; we pray together and

eat together. Each month we have a meeting called a chapter, in which we examine our life – from the finances of the community, which are strictly separate from the parish, to an ongoing discussion of how our various ministries are affected by our common life and how they flow from our common life.

We have elected or appointed officials in the priory: sub prior, who is in charge when the prior is out of town; bursar, who is in charge of our finances; sacristan, who maintains our private chapel and who keeps an account of our Mass stipends and makes sure we've said the intentions we have promised to celebrate at Mass. We also have a lector, who is responsible for our common study. Each month we meet to discuss an article or part of a book that we've read together. He is also responsible for our library, and makes an annual report to our Provincial about the health of the intellectual life of the community. The secretary of the priory takes minutes at our chapter meetings, and also keeps a record of documents that pass back and forth between our priory and the Provincial Office in Oakland.

While we are blessed to have six members in our Priory (soon to be seven, as Fr. Michael Chaberek is returning August 27), only two are assigned as parish priests and Oxy chaplains and receive a stipend from the parish. The others pay room and board to the parish and have other ministries or are retired.

Fr. Jude has a teaching apostolate and is often on the road throughout the western U.S. Fr. Dominic De Lay is on sabbatical this year. He, too, will be gone much of the time, but if he helps out at the parish with Masses, he will receive a stipend from the parish. Fr. Cassian Lewinski and Fr. Donald Bramble are retired, and in exchange for their generosity in hearing confessions and presiding at Mass, their room and board is reduced. Fr. Michael Chaberek will be assisting at local parishes and schools as a supply priest in the San Fernando region and beyond.

I mentioned the priory finances. Our vow of poverty means that each friar does not have private property. The income we receive is held in common, and as a community we give 25% of our income to our Dominican Province to help support the friars in initial formation and the friars who are retired. When people give Fr. Francis or me money for car blessings, weddings, anointing or any other parish work, that money goes to the parish. Money any of us receive for ministry outside the parish is turned in to the priory.

A critical part of our life is prayer and study. These prepare us for our mission of preaching. Sometimes it is difficult for people to understand this. Recently, a well-intentioned man was surprised to learn I have a day off. "I thought priests worked 24/7!" While I am always a priest, it would be foolish to try to work 24/7. Even God took a day off after his labor of creation! But it points to an expectation some may have. We have made a priest available each day for confessions, hospital calls and other emergencies. For other needs, it helps if you call to make an appointment, so the priest on call can still plan his day which includes administrative work (and there's a lot of that!), prayer, study, homily preparation, community duties, marriage preparation, meetings, and more.

I hope this helps you understand the life of the friars who live here in LA and who are sons of St. Dominic, our patron saint.

Dominic was born to the well-to-do Guzmán family in the town of Caleruega in northern Spain. As a young man, he studied the liberal arts and theology at Palencia. After he was ordained a priest, he joined the cathedral canons of the city of Osma, who lived a community life under the rule of St. Augustine while caring for the administrative needs of the cathedral under the direction of the bishop.



When he was about 30, Dominic accompanied his bishop on several diplomatic missions in northern Europe. In the course of these travels he became aware of the religious ideas of the Albigensians, a Manichaean movement in southern France. This sect believed that the soul is good and the body is evil and that people must be purified and must not indulge in any physical pleasures. Dominic saw that the only way to preach orthodox doctrine effectively to these people was to be as poor as they were and to be thoroughly knowledgable in Christian theology. He stayed in southern France for several years and, together with a small group of like-minded men, tried to put his ideas into practice by preaching, studying, praying, and living in poverty.

In 1215 Dominic and his group of 16 were welcomed by the bishop of Toulouse and established as the official preachers of that diocese. Dominic then went to Rome, where he obtained Pope Innocent III's approval for the establishment of a religious order dedicated to preaching and based on a deep knowledge of the Scriptures and Christian

truth. Until this time religious orders had been associated with monasteries, where men lived apart from the world and spent their time in prayer and physical work. But Dominic conceived of a group of men who would be dedicated primarily to preaching and thus to helping people in the mainstream of life. Living together in a city house, where they would pray and study, these men would be able to go wherever they were needed and would substitute study for the traditional manual labor of monks.

In 1217 Dominic showed his confidence in the men who shared his ideal and scattered the little group of 16 around Europe. He sent them in twos to study theology, philosophy and law in Paris, Bologna, Rome and Madrid. Two stayed behind in Toulouse and two more in nearby Prouille. Wherever they went, these men attracted others, and soon there were hundreds of followers of Dominic's ideal, many of them students and masters at universities.

During the next 2 years Dominic traveled over 3,000 miles on foot, visiting and encouraging his men in these cities. In 1220 the first meeting or general chapter of the friars took place in Bologna, and there it was decided that the order would have a representational system of government, with the friars in each house electing their superiors for fixed terms. These representatives met again in 1221 and divided the order geographically into provinces. Shortly after this meeting Dominic died in Bologna in 1221; he was canonized in 1234.

Dominic's genius had several ingredients. He was a charismatic leader, able to evaluate a situation and act decisively. He had confidence in his own ideals and in the people who shared them. His mind was sharpened by study, but before he wrote, lectured, or preached, he turned to God in prayer. It was said of Dominic that "he loved everyone, so everyone loved him." By 1256 the group he had founded had over 13,000 members, and it continues to flourish today, still dedicated to truth and to its motto, *Laudare*, *benedicere*, *praedicare* – to praise, to bless, to preach.

#### TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Bartolomé de las Casas, el gran defensor de los indígenas, nació en Sevilla, España en 1474 y falleció en Madrid en el año 1566. Su larga vida fue dedicada a la presencia española en América.

Bartolomé llegó a la Nueva España para encargarse de una Encomienda. Después fue ordenado sacerdote y recibió a cargo una encomienda de mineros amerindios. Poco a poco su corazón cristiano le abrió los ojos a las injusticias españolas en América. Por eso se hizo fraile dominico e hizo varios viajes a España en defensa de los derechos humanos de los amerindios ante los reyes de España, los cuales le dieron tierras en Venezuela y Chiapas para poner en práctica su teoría humanista acerca de los indígenas.

Hasta el fin de su vida este fraile y teólogo dominico luchó por los derechos de los nativos americanos, buscando convencer a los reyes españoles y a los Papas que la conquista no favorecía la evangelización de los pueblos. Gracias a sus esfuerzos se abolió la esclavitud indígena y se instituyó el diálogo, en lugar de la espada, como instrumento de conversión.
