






Pastor Again: The First 175 Days

After 5 ¹/₂ months, or about 175 days, since I became pastor of St. Dominic's on October 1, 2022, I have thought about my experience in these last months. To return to St. Dominic's after having been called away from my first assignment at St. Dominic's from 2010 to 2015 has been for me like coming back


home. I truly feel at home here at St. Dominic's. Why is that? Because you all welcomed me back so warmly and lovingly.

When I arrived in October, I realized that my first task would be to complete the fund-raising that Fr. Roberto had begun, to raise \$1,130,000, to achieve our goal in the Archdiocesan campaign, "Called to Renew,". Through your amazing generosity, we raised \$1,776,357.92! We now have available to us to repair and update aspects of our facilities \$1,211,357. These funds will be made available to us as you continue to generously make your pledge payments over the next five years. We are working to begin some of these projects, particularly repairing the church dome roof and renovating the church bathrooms. These projects must be approved by the Archdiocese building committee. Once we receive approval we will begin. Thank you all so much for supporting this campaign which will help us to repair our facilities.

That project consumed my time and energy for my first three months. Now the Parish Pastoral Council is working with me to develop and implement a plan for parish discipleship. We are reading together, *Forming Intentional Disciples: The Path to Knowing and Following Jesus*, by Sherry Weddell. Each month we discuss a couple of chapters and develop a list of ideas for discipleship formation programs we will implement in the parish. This will be a project that takes us through this June, and our goal is to implement at least one formation project in the Fall of this year. The theme for our mission at St. Dominic's is Spiritual Renovation. Not only do many of our facilities need renovation, but our spirituality and Catholic faith need renovation also, and that renovation leads to discipleship.

Fr. Francis, Fr. Isaiah, and I meet nearly every week, to discuss and plan the events that are in the near and distant future, especially those events of ministry in the parish. Part of our meetings includes looking ahead at the readings for the next few Sundays. We read them together and look for a common thread that connects the readings for the next few Sundays. We discuss what the main preaching points could be for each Sunday and we work to build on each other's homilies week-by-week to show how the readings connect and build on each other. We want to provide you with insights to Scripture that relate to our daily lives and how we are called to grow in our faith and to live our faith in our daily lives.

I am very excited about the direction we are going in our mission for St. Dominic's. I am so happy to have been able to return here for my second time as Pastor, and I love being here with all of you. Thank you for your generosity, your love, and your support as we journey together in following Jesus to become true disciples of Jesus. God bless you all.



Novices Visit

On February 3-7, Saint Dominic's Priory and Church had the privilege of receiving special guests! Father Anthony Rosevear and our four Dominican Novices visited us as the first stop on their Tour of the Southern Territory of our Western Dominican Province. The Novices their shared vocation stories at the Sunday

Masses, broke bread with our Dominicans Fathers and Brothers, visited Saint Dominic's School and visited the Monastery of the Angels.

The Novitiate Year is the first year for young men who seek and discern to be Dominican Brothers and Priests. Formation is eight years long. The man, once he had received the habit of the Dominicans, is called a Novice. Here, they receive their title ("Brother"), possibly a new religious name, and the ability to discern and live the Dominican way of life. The Novice Year is a discernment year, where, in a limited way, the Novices brothers live the Dominican Life to see if it is a good fit, to see if the Holy Spirit is truly calling him to this particular way towards holiness.

The Novice Tour was instituted over 40 years ago. This was a way for our Novice Brothers to encounter the Province as the whole, the ministries we serve, and the Brothers whom they may vow their lives to.

For us Dominicans here in Eagle Rock, it is an edifying and challenging message to us as we encounter our Novice Brothers. Firstly, it reminds us that the Holy Spirit still works actively within the young Church, calling young men and women to a peculiar and wonderful way of life. This reminds us old guys-Brother Xavier Marie, not so much-to remember the ideals that compelled us to discern and enter the Order, and to renew that Novice Spirit within us. Secondly, it reminds us-and I would imagine, our parish too!!--that Saint Dominic's in Eagle Rock isn't some oasis in the middle of Southern California. Saint Dominic's South is part of a greater Dominican project, all of our ministries and Brothers together to renew and reinvigorate the Word of God to the entire West Coast. It reminds the Novices. our Brothers in Eagle Rock, our parishioners and students at the school that we Dominicans are not merely parish priests in white-that we belong to a greater Dominican project "To Praise, To Bless, To Preach" that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Dear friends, may we gather our prayers to pray for our Novices Brothers: Brother Paul, Brother Anthony Michael, Brother Alphonsus, and Brother Thomas Maria.

Let us pray for vocations together:

Lord Jesus, moved by the urgent need of priests, religious and apostles, and following Thy recommendation to pray to the Lord of the harvest to send laborers to work for the salvation of souls, we implore Thee, through the intercession of Thy Most



Holy Mother Mary, Virgin Immaculate and Queen of the Most Holy Rosary, and also through the intercession of Dominic the Holy Patriarch, to increase the number of Friars Preachers.

Pour forth into families, colleges and seminaries the precious grace of the apostolic vocation, and enkindle in young hearts the sacred fire of the love of God and of souls. Mayest Thou, Thyself, deign to prepare those whom Thou dost call, and incline them to desire and ask for that grace. Preserve them from sin and the many dangers of their age. Mission Update

On February 16, Lay Missionary Tricia Bolle took a flight to Hong Kong, where she will minister for the next several months. As you remember, I am the Spiritual Director of the Saint Francis Xavier Lay Missionary Society. We train and support lay Catholic men and women to be traditional foreign missionaries in various parts of Asia. In the last newsletter, I told you that Tricia flew to many places in Asia as an assessment trip, visiting all of our mission stations, in order to see which ones are still viable and pliant enough to have us preach the Word Made Flesh.

Tricia flew out this time, focusing her attention on Hong Kong, and possibly, Malaysia. I have a special love for the Church in Hong Kong as well as the territory itself; for I gave missions, retreats, and the Called and Gifted Workshop several times before the pandemic.

As of this writing, Tricia has met with the Bishop of Hong Kong, as well as with the Papal Nuncio (ambassador), and a number of lay leaders. Her focus is to revive the English and Chinese speaking young adult ministries, which have floundered during Covid-19. (To give you some perspective, masks were still mandatory indoors till the last week of February.) She has engaged in hikes, lunchtime lectio divina sessions, theological book studies, and individual counselings.

I invite you to be part of our prayer team for Tricia and our missionary endeavor. Team members are

asked to dedicate one sort of prayer once a week for our mission till the team returns home. If you would like to be part of the prayer team, please email <u>frisaiah@laymissionary.org</u>. 

"When I grow up, I will buy you a big house." There the was big promise of a little boy to his grandfather on a The balmy afternoon. grandfather listened as he carried the child on a bike where there was a little backseat attached. There was silence.

Before his big promise, the child had just repented of his little mischief that morning and apologized for talking back to his grandfather. He was so happy and so proud of himself for humbling his little pride and admitting his faults before his loving grandpa. So excited was he that he went on to make a promise. It was the greatest promise the child had ever made in his life. And he did not even know how he was going to fulfill it. All he knew was that their apartment was tiny, poorly furnished, and his grandfather deserved something better. "Of course, I will figure out a way", the child thought.

I was that child. And the one to whom I had promised a big house was my grandfather who has just now passed away. Ever since he passed, memories of him have come to me as I pray for the repose of his soul. When I traced his fingerprints on his handiwork—my soul, I could feel the warmth of his loving hands all over. And this story merely reflects one of many touches he had impressed upon my soul.

As I ponder, I realize that our Lord had made a similar promise to his apostles whom he loved before his departure, the promise of a mansion in His Father's house. *"Let not your hearts* be troubled; believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And when I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." (Jn 14:1-3)

Unlike our Blessed Lord, I never fulfilled my promise as I intended. I never bought my grandfather a physical house. 

Eulogy for Dominique

As I look out at everyone here today gathered to celebrate Dominique's life, I am reminded of one word, love. Throughout all of Dominique's life, she was surrounded by love every minute of the day for twenty-two years. Love from her immediate family, extended family, friends, and everyone who had the privilege of being in her life. Before I continue, I want to thank everyone for being here today to celebrate Dominique's life and everyone who has been so supportive of my family with their love and other kind acts throughout the days prior.

Dominique was born one year and one month after I was born. Some quick information on Dominique is that her favorite color was purple (similar to me), her favorite ice cream flavor was chocolate, her favorite musician was Taylor Swift, her favorite Disney Story was Pinocchio, and she did not like the dark. Some of the places Dominique visited during her lifetime included, but were not limited to; Arizona, Vancouver Canada, Alaska, New Mexico, San Diego, San Francisco, Las Vegas (plenty of times may I add), Mexico, New York (actually going atop the twin towers before 9/11), Reno, Niagara Falls, Mount Rushmore, Hawaii, and even Rome. Her travel was never limited by her wheelchair, for whenever there was a will, there was a way. The way usually being my dad and I lifting Dominique up by her chair and carrying her off in a similar fashion to how I imagine Cleopatra or some other Queen being valeted around. Dominique even had the opportunity to meet both the Dalai Lama and the Pope, covering the bases with not just one, but two important religious leaders.

In many ways, Dominique lived the life of a celebrity. If you ever saw her out, she was never without one of her many pairs of hip sunglasses, many of her clothes were comfortable yet stylish, and she was always surrounded by her entourage. As well as her fashionable taste and company, she was constantly assailed by her fans wishing to say hello to her, especially here at Church. Her "OG" entourage, my mom, my dad, and myself, even developed a system for walking in public.

One person would push her, one would be at the front to clear a path, and one would be at the either side, situation dependent. We even once considered charging for autographs, but Dominique loved her fans and wouldn't allow it. Truly. Dominique was in true form while in Rome. While in the streets of the Vatican city, we had guards pushing people out of the way to make room for Dominique, priests and nuns coming up to pray over her, the Bishop waiting for her arrival, and finally a blessing from the Pope. None of this happened because myself, my mother, or my father were anyone special, but because Dominique WAS someone special, and everyone could so clearly see it. I imagine the treatment is quite the same for Dominique now that she's up in Heaven.

Dominique brought us together and taught us the virtue of patience. She taught us the meaning of love, and she most certainly taught me what it means to be a good person and was and will always be a motivating force in my life to be the best person I can be and to do the most with the gifts I have. Dominique had a different life, but by no means did she live a bad life. She wasn't disabled, she was differently abled. She traveled the world, listened to the latest music, was always doing projects with her teachers, and was never without love. This is a celebration of Dominique and all her life has brought forth for us. Do not feel bad, do not pity, and do not think down on Dominique. Rather, think of all the positive memories and joy that were brought into your life because of Dominique! And most importantly, think of how you may best live your life to the fullest, without hesitation and without wasting any more time. Dominique certainly lived the fullest of lives she could with what time she had here on earth. She had run her course, and like any great actor, knew it was her cue for an exit.

Divorce and Navigating the Marriage Tribunal

Divorce happens. The Catholic Church recognizes the need for some people to divorce but things can get complicated if they wish to remarry in the Church or have their second marriage validated by the Church. The Archdiocese of Los Angeles has an office known as the Marriage Tribunal which exists to help Catholics annul their prior marriage and become free to remarry in the Church. Our Parish can help anyone who wishes to go through the annulment process.

I have been assisting Parishioners with the annulment process for several years. There are fees involved with the Marriage Tribunal but St. Dominic Parish does not charge you for any assistance we give to you during the process.

It is important to note that the Marriage Tribunal annulment process does not affect the civil divorce and any order, such as child support or custody, from the divorce judgment. The Marriage Tribunal also differs from the Civil Courts in that its review of the prior marriage is primarily based on the paperwork filed and interviews—the divorced parties do not appear together before the Tribunal and are not represented by attorneys.

Some Marriage Tribunal cases are relatively simple. When a Catholic marries there are some general requirements such as exchanging the marriage vows before a Priest, using the proper liturgical form or obtaining a dispensation if necessary. If a Catholic marries outside of the Church or without any needed approvals, the Marriage Tribunal may be able to declare the marriage a nullity.

If the marriage took place in the Church, it is still possible for the Marriage Tribunal to issue an annulment but the review process can be complicated. In simple terms, the Church wedding involves a solemn promise before God that the marriage will endure forever and the union will promote the well-being of the couple. What if there was some problem or defect which prevents one or both of the parties from being able to make such a promise? It is not possible to list all of the various reasons why the Church might find a problem but the Marriage Tribunal focuses on each person's state of mind when they exchanged vows. If the Marriage Tribunal finds that one or both of the parties were not capable of making such a solemn promise, it can issue an annulment of the marriage clarifying the parties' right to remarry in the Church.

If you have been divorced and are considering remarrying, having your current marriage validated or just want a clean slate, we can help you get started with the Marriage Tribunal process. I will meet with you at the Parish Office and go over the Marriage Tribunal process including the particular forms needed for your situation. We also can help while you work through the paperwork. Any discussions are completely confidential. While we help you and mail the forms to the Archdiocese, the decision is solely up to the Marriage Tribunal. If you wish to discuss the annulment process, please call the Parish Office at 254-2519 and we can schedule (323)an appointment.

In Third Grade - under Mrs. Morgan's tutorage - we learned the Corporal Works We memorized the words and then of Mercy. discussed what kinds of things third graders could actually do. Splitting your sandwich for a classmate is feeding the hungry. Giving clothes to the SVdP clothing drive is clothing the naked. We were advised that we would need to be older to visit the sick and imprisoned as well as burying the dead. My classmate Richard pointed out that we could bury dead pigeons. Mrs. Morgan patiently explained that much of the Corporal Works of Mercy at St. Dominic were done by the members of the Society which we could join when we were older.

As an adult I wandered into a St. Vincent de Paul meeting and was hooked. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is Jesus' love in action. We actually do hands-on work with those in need. We do home visits in pairs and assess needs. We are empowered to act immediately on some things and consult with the rest of the group on larger actions.

The needs of God's people are many and varied. We have assisted a shockingly beautiful woman who had once been a model who, on a job, jumped from a plane - the parachute failed to open and both of her ankles were severely broken. She regained the ability to walk but not to strut on a catwalk as a model.

Many charities are primarily fundraisers and are known for their dinners and galas. Many faith groups only pray for those in need. "Vinnies" do it all. We meet twice a month - at our meetings we read the Gospel of that Sunday and discuss it. We then discuss any needs or works performed. We end in prayer.
